BCUA PROGRAMS

Household Hazardous Waste

In 2020, the BCUA conducted seven, one-day household hazardous waste (HHW) management events. Due to the COVID-19 emergency, two events were cancelled and one event was moved to an alternate site. These events were held at three different locations throughout Bergen County. In all, 9,550 Bergen County households took advantage of these events to dispose of 900,235 pounds of unwanted hazardous waste materials. These events continue to be the largest attended one-day events in the State of New Jersey.

This popular BCUA program continues this year. All collections are free, but they are open to Bergen County residents only (proof of residency required). At these HHW drop-offs, we will accept a wide range of chemicals used in and around your home. Please keep all items in their original, labeled containers and store them out of reach of children and pets.

No containers, including gasoline and motor oil containers, will be returned, so please plan accordingly. We no longer accept alkaline batteries at the HHW events. Common household batteries with “alkaline” on the label are not classified as hazardous waste and can be safely thrown out in the regular garbage.



Also, no computers, electronics, or tires will be accepted at these events.

Bergen County businesses classified as Conditionally Exempt Small Quantity Generators (CESQG’s) may participate in this program for a nominal fee. 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Why Are Lithium Batteries in the News?

Lithium batteries have attracted a lot of attention in recent years. Lithium batteries are commonly found in cellphones, laptops, cordless phones, household electronics, and power tools. If damaged, lithium batteries are prone to explode or start a fire. In fact, once these batteries are damaged or punctured, they’re a fire waiting to happen. If you throw that type of hazardous material into a collection truck headed to a sorting facility or landfill, all of which are full of potential “fuel,” it could mean disaster.

Recently, New Jersey experienced a deep loss at a facility in nearby Passaic. The Atlantic Coast Fibers recycling facility was totally destroyed by a fire on January 29, 2021. Thankfully, no lives were lost. However, this fire had a significant impact in Bergen County because more than half of the municipalities utilized this facility to process their recyclables. The fire chief on site indicated that a lithium battery in a bale was the cause of the fire.

This is not the first fire ignited by batteries at a recycling facility. Batteries are a major problem for recycling facilities since residents mistakenly think they can toss batteries in with their recycling because a recycling symbol is often printed on the label. It is important to recycle batteries and keep them out of the

trash. However, they do NOT belong in curbside or drop-off recycling bins intended for mixed household recycling.

So what can you do?

- Tape the terminals of lithium batteries and/or place them into individual, sealed plastic bags to ensure protection against possible short circuits.
- Dispose of batteries through a special program:
 - Check with your local municipality for battery recycling options.
 - Bring your batteries to a BCUA household hazardous waste collection event (see above or visit our website).
 - Visit Call2Recycle.org for a list of battery recycling sites.

Tire Recycling

During 2020, the BCUA collected 1,096 tires from Bergen County residents for recycling. Due to the COVID-19 emergency, two events were cancelled last year.

For Residents: The BCUA hosts one-day drop-off events for tire recycling. There is a limit of four tires per participant. Tires with or without rims will be accepted. These events are for Bergen County residents only (no businesses).

Mobile Paper Shredding

Residents may deliver their confidential paper documents to various locations and observe as their documents are shredded on site. Acceptable documents are limited to confidential and sensitive materials only. Non-confidential materials, such as books, magazines, and newspapers, should be recycled through your local municipal recycling program and will not be accepted. You do not have to remove paper clips, staples, or paperboard binder covers. To accommodate all of those wishing to participate, there is a limit of four (4) bags or boxes of documents weighing no more than 10 pounds each.

The BCUA offers each municipality the opportunity to host a collection event at a municipal site of its choice. In addition, the BCUA sponsors four one-day collection events at two locations in Bergen County. In 2020, 57 municipalities opted to participate in this program and the BCUA hosted two county-wide collection events (two were cancelled due to COVID-19). Through these programs, the BCUA collected a total of 345,871 pounds of confidential paper for destruction and recycling.

Computers and Electronics

During 2020, the BCUA collected 48,018 pounds of computer and electronic equipment for recycling from both residents and businesses.

For Residents: The BCUA operates the Computer and Electronics Recycling Depot for all Bergen County residents at the BCUA, Foot of Empire Blvd., Moonachie. This depot is open Monday through Friday, from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. The BCUA also hosts one-day drop-off events for Bergen County residents only (no businesses).

For Businesses: The Computer and Electronics Recycling Depot accepts equipment from businesses for a nominal fee. Payment must be made by check only and materials must be received by appointment only. Contact the BCUA Environmental Programs Hotline at 201-807-5825 for complete details.

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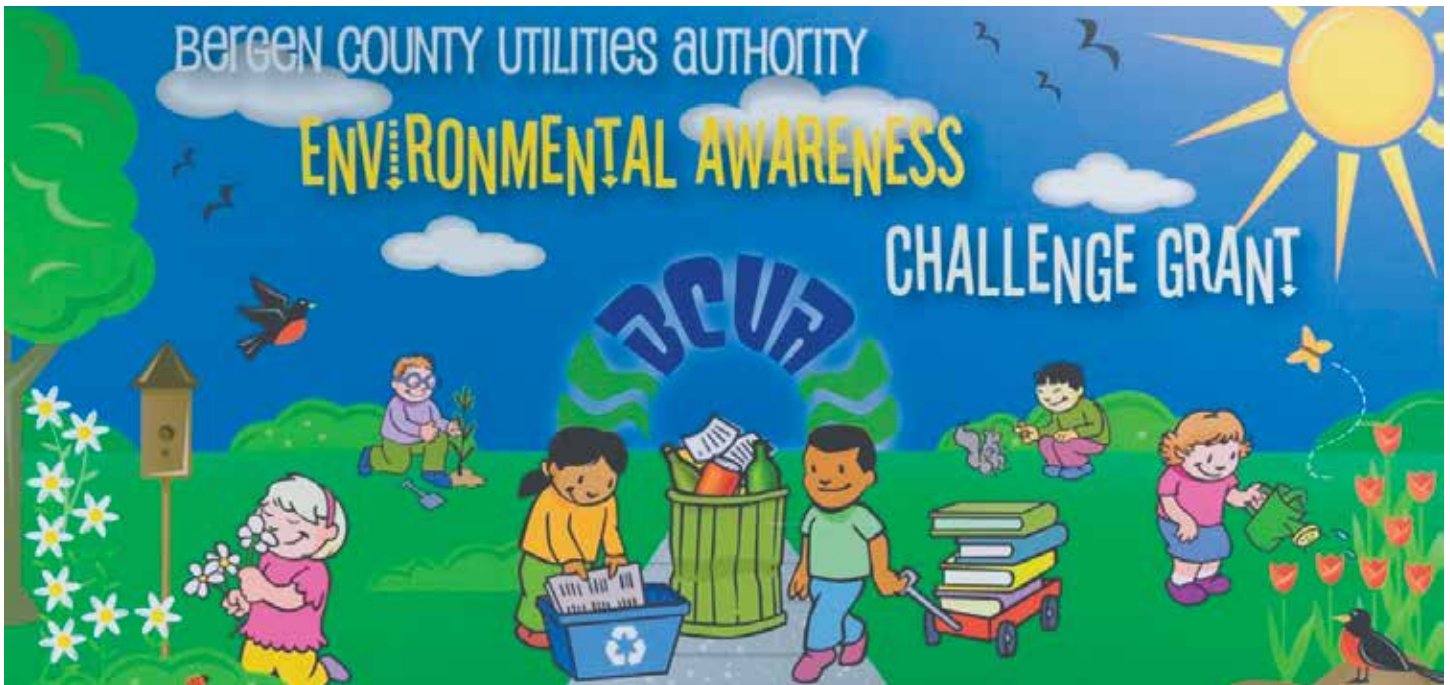
Plastic Bag Ban

Governor Murphy has signed into law a bill banning plastic bags. The law prohibits the provision or sale of single-use plastic carryout bags, single-use paper carryout bags, and expanded polystyrene foam food service products. It also limits provision of single-use plastic straws and appropriates monies from the Clean Communities Program Fund for public education.

The new rules for plastic and paper bags, plastic straws, and polystyrene containers will become effective in May 2022. There are exemptions for some disposable items, including:

- Bags wrapping raw meat
- Polystyrene butcher trays
- Bags used for loose items, like produce
- Bags that hold fish or insects from pet stores
- Dry cleaning bags
- Newspaper bags
- Bags carrying prescription drugs

Dozens of cities, towns, and counties across New Jersey have already passed some form of restriction on plastic bags, straws, and polystyrene food containers. (Many of those local rules have been put on hold by the coronavirus pandemic.) The new law allows those existing measures to remain in place until the new statewide regulations take effect.



BCUA Awards Grants to Schools

One area hit especially hard by the COVID-19 pandemic was the education sector. As the emergency unfolded last year, forcing the closure of many schools, educators had to create alternative teaching methods. Globally, more than 1.2 billion children were out of the classroom. As a result, education has changed dramatically, with a notable rise in e-learning, whereby teaching is undertaken remotely and on digital platforms. Teachers across the country have risen to the occasion and the BCUA joined them in this endeavor by offering virtual education programming, as well as continuing the Environmental Awareness Challenge Grant Program.

Program applications were sent to multiple school representatives in more than 370 public and private schools. Due to the COVID-19 emergency, the BCUA extended the application submittal deadline from May to December 2020. The BCUA received 29 grant applications. After reviewing each application, the BCUA awarded a total of \$27,379.98 in grants to these 28 schools:
